Barricades, shields, contained detonation chambers, and "zero quantity-distance (Q-D)" magazines are examples of engineering controls.</p> <p>Engineering controls are designed and tested in a rigorous fashion. The construction of the engineering control must be carefully duplicated in field applications to assure it will function properly.</p> <p>It is thus imperative that engineering controls be built exactly in accordance with the design package, and that they be used only for the articles (e.g.munitions) for which they are authorised.</p>

Respiratory protection

One end should be coiled into the sawdust or under the paper and the other end lit from a minimum distance of 7m from the trail. ▶ Retire at least 300m or to a safe place. ▶ DO NOT return to the site for at least 30 minutes after the burning has apparently finished. ▶ If the fire goes out do not approach for at least 15 minutes after all trace of fire has gone. ▶ DO NOT add more diesel oil unless certain that the flame is completely extinguished. <p>[DYN0]</p>
